

Dan Kaman called the meeting to order at 5 p.m. after the **Invocation**, given by Dave Waddington, and the **Pledge of Allegiance**.

The clerk called **the roll** and the following Commissioners responded: Dave Waddington, Diedre Cole, Pervis Brown, Dan Kaman, John Hamilton, Dick Brady and Julie Farrar.

City staff present: Todd Roth – Engineer, Jim Lang – Interim Police Chief, Paul Ricci – Fire Chief, Scott Miller – General Services Director, Carrie Handy – Chief Planner, Tom Whitted – IT Manager, Don Icsman – Law Director & Acting City Manager, Hank Solowiej – Finance Director and Kelly Kresser – Commission Clerk.

Upon motion of Dave Waddington and second of Diedre Cole, the commission voted to approve the minutes of the July 11 and July 18, 2011 meetings and dispensed with the oral reading. All Ayes. The President declared the motion passed.

PRESENTATIONS

Dave Waddington presented a **certificate of accomplishment to Shawn Bahnsen who was the first place champion for the third time at the golf tournament held at Mills Creek Golf Course** on July 23. Dave Waddington thanked Shawn Bahnsen for giving back to the kids in the community with the assistance he provides at the golf course.

Pam Colbert, Executive Director of the United Way of Erie County, provided a recap of the 2010 annual report and distributed copies to the commissioners. Pam Colbert said United Way of Erie County has been in the community since 1923 and its mission is to create the organized capacity for people to care for one another. She said there are four approved program areas including children and youth services, independence and self sufficiency, basic and emergency needs and services for physical and mental health. 2010 highlights for the United Way of Erie County are as follows:

- 2-1-1 Information and Referral Hotline - handled 1836 calls
- Ohio Benefit Bank - provided tax clinics for 40 individuals; 8 volunteers at 3 sites
- Erie County Community Council
- FamilyWize Discount Prescription cards - 652 claims resulting in \$6000 in savings
- The Stamp Out Hunger campaign - provided 7,100 lbs. of food
- Day of Caring - 20 volunteers for REV3 Triathlon
- Make A Difference Day - Adopt a Highway and food collection
- Training programs

Pam Colbert provided information relative to the demographics of the clientele served and noted the largest percentage was from the City of Sandusky and Perkins Township. She recapped the specific number of persons affected by the United Way of Erie County including residents, families, individuals, volunteers, persons with disabilities and seniors. The goal of the United Way of Erie County is to make sure that people who need services and resources in Erie County know where and how to access them.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION

Gary Guendelsberger, 726 Walnut Ridge Lane, said during the April 25 city commission meeting, a discussion took place about reallocating revolving loan fund (RLF) monies for street projects. He said it would be unwise for the city commission to reallocate RLF monies for the Columbus Avenue resurfacing project (Item #2).

Upon motion of Diedre Cole and second of Dave Waddington, the commission voted to accept all communications. All Ayes. The President declared the motion passed.

CURRENT BUSINESS

ITEM #1 - Submitted by Scott A. Miller, Director of General Services

Budgetary Information: The City of Livingston, KY has offered \$4,400 for the purchase of two former patrol vehicles with equipment from the City of Sandusky. The City of Livingston, KY is starting a new program and needs marked vehicles. The fleet maintenance supervisor and the director of general services have determined that this is a fair price and better than what would be expected if the vehicles and equipment were auctioned on www.govdeals.com and are recommending the sale of the vehicles

and equipment to the City of Livingston, KY. In addition to obtaining the maximum return to the city for the sale, it is our desire to support and cooperate with other governmental entities, especially during the current economical conditions.

ITEM #2 - Submitted by Jane E. Cullen, Engineering Technician

Budgetary Information: The estimated cost of the project, including engineering, inspection, advertising and miscellaneous costs is \$182,000. The project will be funded with Community Development Block Grant funds in the amount of \$150,000 and the \$5 license fee fund will provide the remaining \$32,000.

RESOLUTION NO. 028-11R: It is requested a Resolution be passed **declaring the necessity for the city to proceed with the proposed Columbus Avenue resurfacing project;** approving the specifications and engineer's estimate of cost thereof; and directing the city manager to advertise for and receive bids in relation thereto; and declaring that this Resolution shall take immediate effect in accordance with section 14 of the city charter.

Upon motion of Dave Waddington and second of Pervis Brown, the commission voted to adopt this Resolution under suspension of the rules and in accordance with Section 14 of the city charter.

Discussion: Carrie Handy said the amount of revolving loan fund (RLF) money proposed to be used for this project was authorized by the commission through their approval of the CDBG action plan budget. She said the reallocation amount is \$13,000 and would need to be amended if the city commission does not wish to use RLF money for the project. Carrie Handy said it was suggested to utilize a large sum of RLF funds for a road project but she would not recommend this as it does not regenerate as if when used for a small business. Dick Brady said he is opposed to using any RLF money for a road project and asked if there is precedence for doing so. Dick Brady said the concept of a RLF is to generate future dollars and does not see a return for putting this money into blacktop. He believes the \$13,000 could perhaps be obtained from another source and said RLF monies should be used to leverage the city's assets. Dick Brady said this project has not yet been bid and therefore, the city does not know what the true cost is; it may actually be less than the engineer's estimate. Carrie Handy said there is a large balance (over \$7,000) in the RLF which is a sufficient amount to leverage for a business requesting a loan. Carrie Handy said if the money sits in a RLF too long, HUD checks on the balance and monitors how the program income is spent. She said \$160,000 of RLF money was spent for demolition of the trailer park at Lions Park and the monies available must be spent at some point in time. Dave Waddington said he supports this project to improve upon a street with both RLF money and \$5 license fee funds. John Hamilton asked the location of Homestead Street and if the underground piping is all working well in this area. Todd Roth said Homestead Street is just south of the Columbus Avenue underpass and noted the lines are being videotaped to assess their condition prior to starting the project. Dick Brady asked if the RLF monies proposed to be spent would be lower if the total cost is less than projected and Carrie Handy said the regular CDBG money would be spent first.

Roll call on the motion: Yeas: Dave Waddington, Pervis Brown, Dan Kaman, John Hamilton, Dick Brady and Julie Farrar, 6. Nays: Diedre Cole, 1. The President declared the motion passed.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Upon motion of Julie Farrar and second of Diedre Cole, the commission voted to accept a donation in the amount of \$150 from Joann Kleinfelder to the Green Fund for trees to be planted in the boulevard (Account #863 3430 485 00). All Ayes. The President declared the motion passed.

Upon motion of Dave Waddington and second of Pervis Brown, the commission voted to accept a donation in the amount of \$150 from Thomas Lazzara to the Green Fund for trees to be planted in the boulevard (Account #863 3430 485 00). All Ayes. The President declared the motion passed.

Upon motion of Dave Waddington and second of Pervis Brown, the commission voted to accept a donation in the amount of \$75 from the City of Independence, Ohio to the Friends of the Greenhouse Fund (Account #863 3483 485 00). All Ayes. The President declared the motion passed.

Upon motion of Dave Waddington and second of Julie Farrar, the commission voted to accept a donation in the amount of \$1,550 from David and Victoria Pletcher in honor of their parents to the Park Trust Fund (Account #863 4860 485 00). All Ayes. The President declared the motion passed.

Upon motion of Pervis Brown and second of Diedre Cole, the commission voted to accept a donation in the amount of \$500 from Hoty Enterprises, Inc. on behalf of Sandusky Boat Storage, LLC, to the Sandusky Recreation Department for the children's summer programs. All Ayes. The President declared the motion passed.

Don Icsman provided an update regarding the **farm land property which is for sale and owned by the City of Sandusky at Bogart Road and Old Railroad**; he distributed copies of the two offers received to date. He said an amendment to the first proposal was received today increasing the per acre offer. Don Icsman said the city commission will ultimately decide to whom it will sell the property and under what terms. He said the first offer made indicated a closing by the end of this week while the second offer is contingent upon the buyer obtaining financing sixty days beyond the acceptance date. Don Icsman said these are all viable offers to be considered and a timetable should be established to allow the sale to occur.

Upon motion of Pervis Brown and second of Dave Waddington, the commission voted to take bids for sale of this property until August 8.

Discussion: Dan Kaman said interested bidders should be referred to David Biechele, the city's agent. Don Icsman said both parties who have already made offers have attorneys and he will present the offers received to the city commission at the second meeting in August. Don Icsman said the city commission will make a decision based upon the offers and an ordinance will then be brought forward for consideration. Dick Brady said he will make a call based upon the offers made and the ability of the purchaser to obtain financing; Dan Kaman said this decision will be based upon the best offer made. Don Icsman said he will communicate this information to those who have already made offers on the property.

All Ayes. The President declared the motion passed.

OLD BUSINESS

Dave Waddington said he recently met with Hank Solowiej about the **housing issue** and within the last week, a theft crime claim was made with the city's insurance company for over \$1 million. He feels confident the city may seek closure for this issue by the end of the year. Hank Solowiej said documentation has been sent to the insurance company and he will be meeting with them this week about the process.

NEW BUSINESS

John Hamilton asked who is running **the new paper district marina** which is a rather large investment for the city. John Hamilton said he does not believe the dockhand positions were bid out correctly and the job description lists three pages of analytical skills, but nothing about tying a boat to a cleat on a dock. John Hamilton asked if the city is marketing the marina or if three people are working there waiting for boats to show up. He said it was more important for one employee to go fishing than to work and wondered if this were still a problem. John Hamilton said Jon Komarek had a plan and was trying to market the marina, but the marina is being treated as a bureaucracy rather than as a business. John Hamilton said Leamington is a sister city to Sandusky and we could benefit by visiting this marina to learn how to run ours and get other ideas. John Hamilton said the finger piers closest to the bay (for larger boats) are 32' apart and built for a 40' – 45' boat, yet larger boats have a 15' beam and if two were put together, there would not be room for fenders. John Hamilton said there is not a place to plug a 30 amp cord, yet there is supposed to be electric service. He said the city should look into some of these issues before making the final payment for the marina construction. John Hamilton said the dockmaster's office should face the docks and Sandusky Bay and that the food or concession area should face the (future) amphitheatre/stage area. Scott Miller said there are three seasonal employees currently working at the marina and two others are being worked into the schedule. He said there are less people working in the morning than in the afternoons and that security and operational items are still a work in progress. John Hamilton asked if these jobs were bid out as they can be traced to nepotism and asked if affirmative action took place or if any female employees were hired. Todd Roth said the positions were advertised as dockhands in the newspaper and two of the employees were hired because of past experience working at other marinas. He said the job description may not have had the specific requirements mentioned by John Hamilton, but noted those hired have past experience. John Hamilton asked how many of the employees will leave by August 15 for college and Scott Miller said two. Diedre Cole said she is terribly sorry for John Hamilton things did not work out for his (John's) uncle, Jon Komarek, to work at the marina, but felt 'throwing the staff under the bus' because of what he perceives as problems with the marina is inappropriate. Diedre Cole said to accuse the staff of nepotism when John's uncle was running the marina, is the pot calling the kettle black. Diedre Cole said the city is muddling through with opening of the marina through this season and is doing the best it can with what it has. Diedre Cole applauded the staff for getting the marina up and running and said the city commission voted for what was constructed and paid for. John Hamilton said just prior to the opening of the marina, there was not a manager and he suggested hiring his uncle who is a very fair person. John Hamilton said Jon Komarek may have had it coming to lose his job but as a taxpayer and a boat owner, he sees some real problems with the marina. Dan Kaman said he has been to the new marina three times since it opened and said one of the dockhands who helped him tie up was an eagle scout and does know how to tie knots. He said the other employee worked at marinas at Kelleys Island and in Sandusky.

Don Icsman said he is disappointed at John Hamilton's remarks and wished he (John) would have said something when this happened. Don Icsman said he feels very comfortable with the people currently running the marina and that the employees were hired through human resources, and some, at the behest of Jon Komarek. Don Icsman said one of the problems with Jon Komarek was that he was trying to spend too much money at/for a brand new marina. Don Icsman said the concept is to put the management of the marina together with the management of the boat launch facility and he will explore ideas about who the right person is to do this. He has spoken with the former police chief, Bob Runner, who is also a captain, who has some very good ideas along these lines. Don Icsman said the city put its faith into reputable and competent people in building the marina, but this does not mean it is perfect. Don Icsman said he is disappointed such a positive thing can be tainted for personal agendas. John Hamilton said he was not making this a personal agenda, he is looking at reality.

Pervis Brown said he received a phone call from Marvin Hunter who was cited for **hauling refuse beyond the hours posted in the city's ordinance and for hauling out of zone**. Pervis Brown said the commission should take another look at this law which was sitting on a shelf for many years but recently put into effect and which people are not aware of. He said some issues were brought forward regarding

compactors but the law is vague regarding others. Pervis Brown said the police force may interpret some things in the ordinance and it should all be made clear. He said haulers picking up trash from backyards previously were permitted to do so on any day and in any zone. Pervis Brown said in fairness, haulers should be made aware of the law and its intent. Diedre Cole said at the last commission meeting, she mentioned plans to host a series of public meetings for all trash haulers to provide a thorough understanding of how the solid waste laws work. She would also like to provide information about where money can be obtained to upgrade equipment. Diedre Cole said she has not received a response from Jim Lang or Don Icsman about this issue which was brought to her attention during the weekend, but will contact Marvin Hunter once she does. Dan Kaman asked Diedre Cole and Pervis Brown to work on this issue and report back to the full city commission with recommendations. Pervis Brown said more immediate action needs to take place to freeze or cease the issuance of citations to persons who should not be getting them. Dick Brady said this is not how government works and the city should not **not** enforce an ordinance duly passed by the city commission. Dick Brady asked Don Icsman to explain what Pervis Brown is talking about regarding curbside recycling and picking up trash in zones and from backyards. Don Icsman said there is an ordinance about refuse hauling and the city commission recently voted to keep it in place. Don Icsman said the city's paralegal attended every meeting held for the haulers during the past couple of years, they were recorded, and there was never discussion about not enforcing the zones with respect to backyard pickup. He said the idea of requiring compactor trucks has been in existence for 15 years and a legal opinion was rendered by an expert in zoning who said the city could enforce the ordinance as it determined, or effective January 1. He said the city cannot be responsible for those who did not attend the meetings and that the haulers knew the enforcement aspect was coming. This is a quality of life issue and a noise issue; the only new thing in the ordinance pertained to recycling. Don Icsman said part of the city's agreement with the EPA was to begin enforcement of the ordinance. He said the city commission could, over his objection, vote to change this ordinance. Dan Kaman said the city is spending way too much time continuing to talk about trash every two weeks. Dave Waddington said there is a solid waste district policy committee and that the city tried to save jobs rather than being driven to one hauler. Dave Waddington said the solid waste appeals board should be the starting point for these types of issues. Julie Farrar reminded residents to be considerate by taking trash containers to the back of their house once they have been emptied and Dan Kaman said he wishes everyone had a trash barrel.

Upon motion of Dave Waddington and second of Diedre Cole, the commission voted to hold an executive session regarding personnel, police department. Roll call on the motion: Yeas: Dave Waddington, Diedre Cole, Pervis Brown, Dan Kaman, John Hamilton, Dick Brady and Julie Farrar, 7. The President declared the motion passed.

Upon motion of Dave Waddington and second of Diedre Cole, the commission voted to hold an executive session regarding the purchase and sale of real property. Roll call on the motion: Yeas: Dave Waddington, Diedre Cole, Pervis Brown, Dan Kaman, John Hamilton, Dick Brady and Julie Farrar, 7. The President declared the motion passed.

Under **Audience Participation**, the following persons offered their comments:

Wesley Poole, 1939 East Oldgate, suggested the law written about picking up trash in specific zones did not necessarily pertain to those picking up trash from backyards. He said this issue deals with livelihoods and jobs and should be straightened out. Wesley Poole asked why police are spending a lot of time on this issue with all of the beatings and killings in the community. Don Icsman said the effective enforcement date of the new solid waste ordinance was January 1 and the city commission requested that it be enforced by the police at a public meeting. Don Icsman said regulating trash and noise is a quality of life issue. Wesley Poole said Marvin Hunter's problem started with picking up trash in zones behind homes and Don Icsman said this particular issue was not discussed during the meetings held last year. He said there are tapes of all of the meetings and he does not know where this misconception came from. Wesley Poole said the issue is whether the law is productive and whether it does (or does not) have unintended consequences. Wesley Poole said laws can change at any time because of lobbying. Wesley Poole asked how the city managed to survive for so long without enforcing the compactor provision. Dan Kaman said the city had the opportunity to switch to one hauler last year but chose to enforce what is now on the books.

Jerry Garrett, city diversity consultant, 1500 East Bogart Road, said 23 years ago he represented Lewis Knight on behalf of the N.A.A.C.P. over the compactor issue and it is important to point out it is not just a matter of what the law says. He said when the Memphis trash haulers held strikes, it was a matter of human dignity and this should be kept in mind. Jerry Garrett said many haulers raised their families in this business and the city is dealing with human beings and families.

Julie Killian, 1133 Third Street, said she utilized Yoeder Construction for roofing and siding at her home and asked why this is not being inspected since a permit was pulled for the job. Julie Killian said her roof was ruined and water was coming out of an outlet; the siding now needs to be replaced because it is bowed. She asked why the city does not have a process for complaining so that this does not happen to someone else. Julie Killian said when she inquired about having something done about this she was told the persons who were subject to embezzlement were important, not those who had work done by the company. Todd Roth said inspections are scheduled during construction projects and will meet with Julie Killian to see if this complaint can be resolved.

Juanita Sherrills, 2400 Milan Road, said the Keller building is beautiful with a historic feeling and asked if Thomas Fortin purchased this building for \$100,000; Dave Waddington said the building has not yet been purchased. Juanita Sherrills said city hall would look better if it were moved downtown. Juanita Sherrills asked about the city getting money back that was paid for the study performed by the Anderson Economic Group; Carrie Handy said the downtown market study was finished and will provide a copy to Juanita Sherrills. Juanita Sherrills said the downtown buildings are dilapidated and vacant and asked why the city is considering the use of CDBG money for them as this money should be for poverty stricken residents. Dan Kaman said a yearly report is provided for these funds and that Carrie Handy could talk about this after the meeting. Juanita Sherrills said she would like to organize the National Night Out which was talked about at the last city commission meeting.

Marvin Hunter, 1209 Johnson Street, said he finds it reprehensible that he is not exempted from curbside service and if placed in zones, he can no longer financially afford to run his business as the city is telling him what can be done in two days must be done in five. He said this adds fuel and other costs. He said if residents have trash picked up from their backyard, it is not considered curbside service. Marvin Hunter said it does not matter what he complies with, there are city ordinances to discourage him and make him spend more money.

Willie McCarty, 632½ East Adams Street, said the police officers did not make an incorrect or unprofessional remark to him. Willie McCarty said Don Icsman helped do all he could to make his event a success (the Pow Wow at Shoreline Park). He said the message which should be taken from his previous remarks is about a misunderstanding between the owners of a large waterfront facility (the Sandusky Yacht Club). He runs a not-for-profit company and stated Section 519.09 of the noise control ordinance provides for exceptions and suggested he should have been exempted from obtaining a noise permit. Willie McCarty said he respects the law enforcement personnel, but is not pleased with being told what to do at two o'clock in the afternoon; he said the city cannot pick and choose whom to enforce the laws upon. Willie McCarty said the city should look at the laws on the books and see if things are out of date. Don Icsman said there may be some misunderstanding about this law or the waiver and even those who have obtained permits are not exempted from the sound; it is not a pass to play music louder than the ordinance allows. Willie McCarty said the commission has a job to do right now and not to worry about being here, or not, next year.

Barbara Clark, N.A.A.C.P. President, said the issue with trash haulers is not over and she would like to see something done to benefit everyone in the community. She said the children in the community are on her mind and asked if the city still has a curfew law; she said the recent beating incident involved ten to twenty kids beating up one person and asked where the parents are. Barbara Clark said she believes the police know who these children are, who their parents are, and that the community should come together and have a town hall meeting to discuss how to deal with parents and the curfew law. Barbara Clark said there are some kids in the detention home and asked what the punishment is for their parents. She said this is not about color. Diedre Cole said if she had her way, the parents would be sitting in the detention home with their children. She suggested lowering the curfew time to 9 p.m. (from 11 p.m.).

Sharon Johnson, 1139 Fifth Street, asked if the final payment has been made to the contractor for the paper district marina and Dan Kaman said this payment will be made once the timeline is complete and the items on the punch list are completed. Dan Kaman said the city is holding back \$100,000± and will not make final payment until the city is happy with the end result/product. Sharon Johnson asked if there is an advertising budget for the paper district marina and Dan Kaman said there is not one for 2011. He said the marina is being advertised online. Sharon Johnson said there is city land for sale on Cleveland Road by the radio station, on Pipe Street and on Old Railroad, yet no appraisals were performed. Dan Kaman said the real estate agent used comparables for these properties so that the city did not have to spend money up front and once offers are made, appraisals and surveys will be performed. Sharon Johnson said the city should take the offer of \$1,000 more per acre for the Old Railroad property and Dan Kaman said someone else may offer even more after the offer is accepted. Pervis Brown said any new business should expect to lose money in the first year.

Jim Lang provided **an update from the police department regarding the recent findings released by the ICMA in their comprehensive analysis.** Jim Lang said there were 32 recommendations made with six having already been implemented including:

- A continuation of the 12-hour shift schedules
- Detectives working evenings and weekends
- Detectives are effective in their investigations and no further recommendations should be implemented
- Policy manual directive regarding evidence and property was completed last week
- Review options to expand evidence - was completed last week including the creation of an additional room for DNA evidence
- Training programs, i.e. college tuition reimbursement, is included the union contract and is a covered reimbursement

Jim Lang said there are other items being worked on and an update will be provided at a future meeting. Jim Lang showed **a map with colored pins identifying the areas where shots have been fired or reports of shots being fired.** He said these locations are scattered throughout the city but there is a small group near Hancock Street, Camp Street & MacArthur Park, and near Firelands Community Hospital.
