



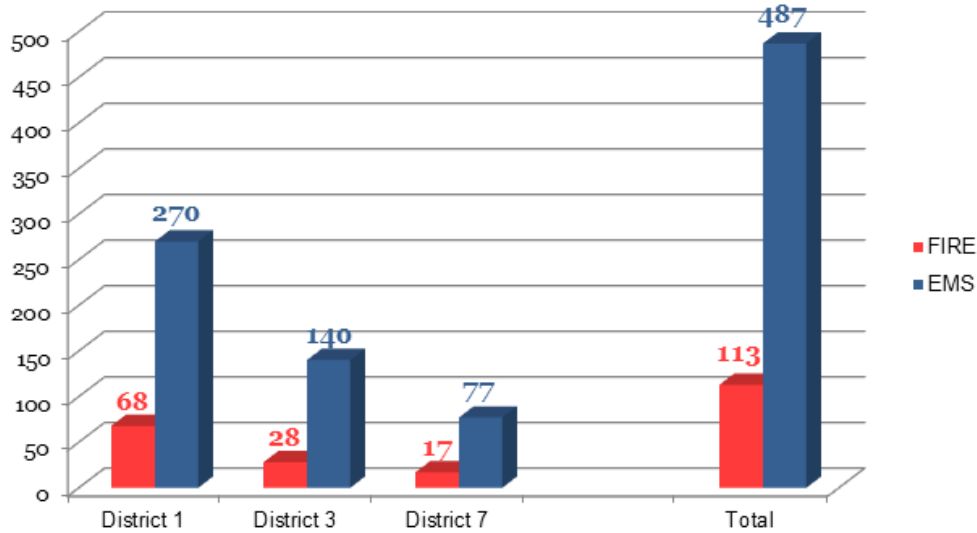

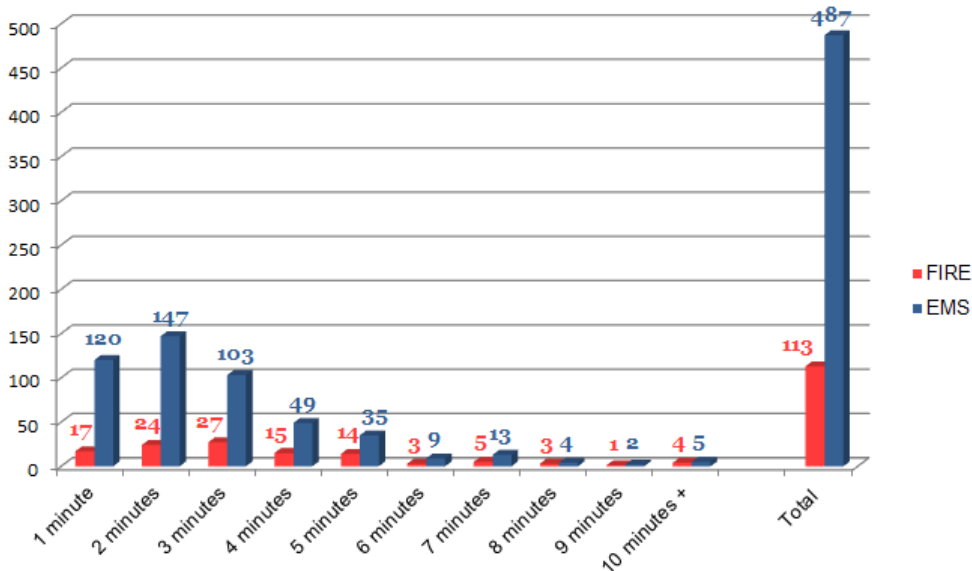


District Statistics



There were 600 responses in June. 56% percent of all responses were in District 1. Responses in District 3 and District 7 were 28% and 16% respectively.

Response Time

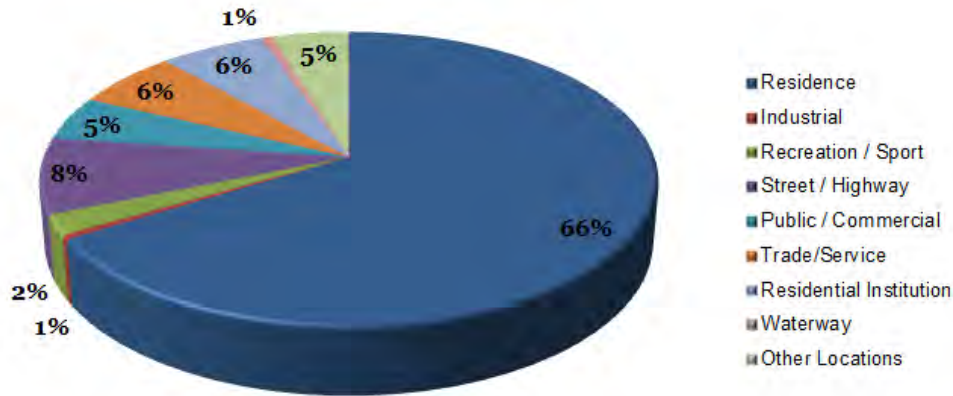


The average response time for fire emergencies was 3 minutes and 51 seconds. The average response time for EMS emergencies was 3 minutes and 9 seconds.

The Sandusky Fire Department responded to 75% of fire emergencies within four minutes and 86% of EMS emergencies within four minutes. This calculates to 84% of all emergency calls within four minutes.

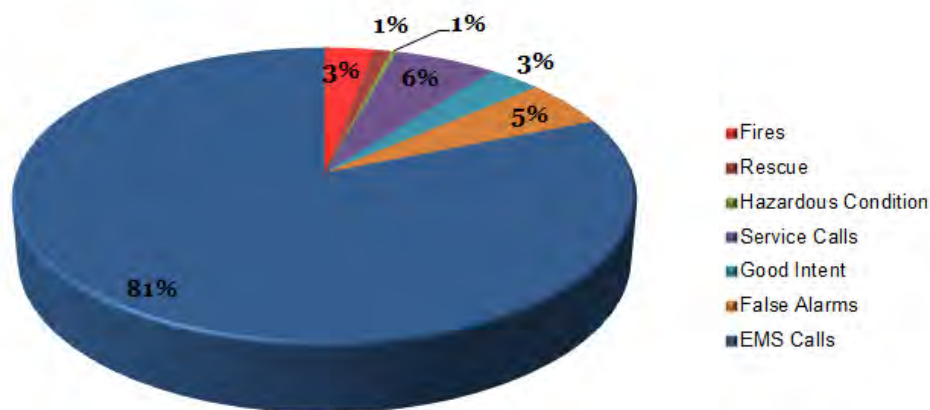


Response by Location



In June, 66% of all emergency responses were to residential occupancies (residences, nursing homes and residential institutions). Commercial buildings, recreational occupancies and streets and highways totaled 15%.

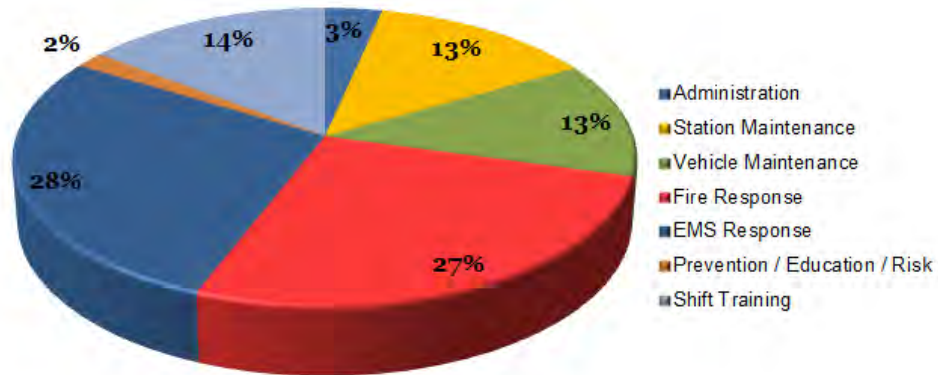
Incident Type



Ambulance service continues to be the highest requested service at 81%. Structure fire activity was 3% of all emergent activity. False alarms represented 5% of all June emergent activity. There was \$120,815 in fire loss.

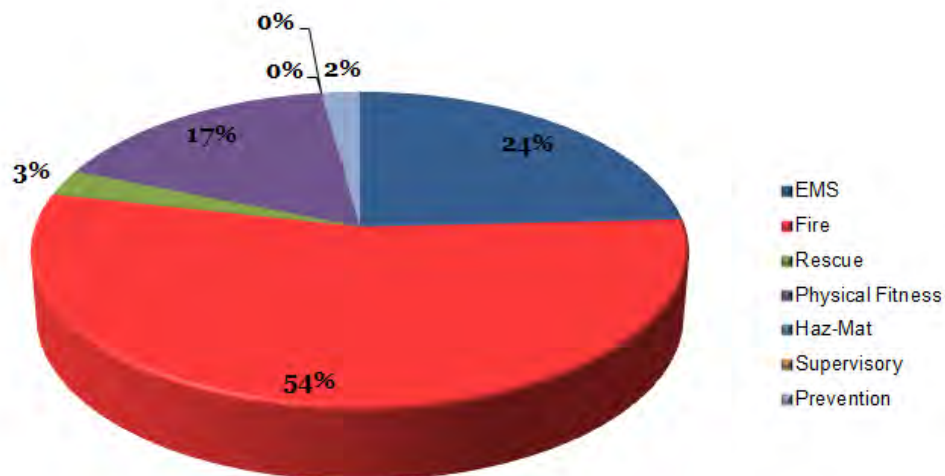


Activity



55% of all June activity was emergency response. Station and vehicle maintenance was 26% and training was 14%.

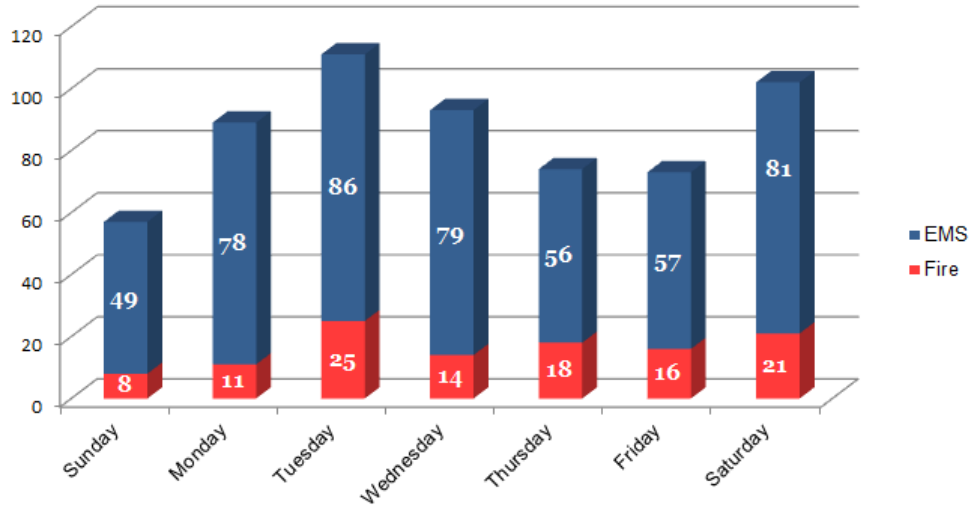
Training Analysis



17% of June training was physical fitness training. 54% was fire training with the focus on fire ground operations. 24% of training focused on EMS and the remaining 3% percent focused on rescue and prevention.

Staffing

- The average daily staffing for June was 12 personnel per day.

Mutual –Aid

- Sandusky Fire Department received mutual-aid one time in the month of June and provided mutual-aid three times.

Fire Prevention Bureau

Bureau activities for June included: Continuing education, public education, plans review and meeting for the new Holiday Inn Express. Flow testing for the same hotel to verify the need for a fire pump. Vendor inspections, fire lane marking, and pyro inspection for Ohio Bike Week.

Public Education consisted of extinguisher and fire safety training for Fireland's Regional Medical Center. Post bike week had the Bureau preparing for the Fourth of July holiday. This included attending the fireworks continuing education class sponsored by the State Fire Marshal's office. Flyers were delivered to the areas of the city that historically displayed illegal fireworks shows.
